
# **Monstrous Feminine**

"Can this happen to a normal woman?"
There has been a long held tradition of representing women as victims in the Horror genre, and usually with an accompanying loss of clothing. However, here at the No6 we will be showing a season of films that illustrate that sometimes women can turn the tables and be, well, Monstrous.

The 1970's and 1980's saw a new wave of horror films in which women were able to achieve revenge on the (male) monster that terrorised them and thus escape from the shackles of victimhood. It was also an era in the formative throes of feminism which made this shift in representation possible.

The first film of our season is the iconic movie of the sub-genre is Carrie (1976), it is the quintessential example of how the female takes revenge on her tormentors, but in the process of doing so herself becomes a 'Monster'. The second film will be Cat People (1942) as well as being sublime horror, it shows the threat to male dominance of the Sisterhood, while Rosemary's Baby (1968) screening in Nov, posits the pregnant female body as the source of a battle between good and evil.





Battleships of the Silent Era

If it isn't cars or trains, then ships aren't that far behind when it came to the most photographed forms of transport of the silent era.

Over the course of two days, No.6 and South West Silents are proud to present a mini season centred around great Battleships of the Silent Era. Portsmouth's Historic Dockyard couldn't be a more perfect setting to screen three classic battleship films of the silent era.

This mini season, made up of a true classic title of the era (Battleship Potemkin) and two very much forgotten British silents (Zeebrugge and Nelson): Battleships of the Silent Era will give you an insight, as well as plenty of seafaring action, into the silent film world of the Battleship.
